

My fellow Collier family!

This first edition for 2024 is dedicated to the significant events of our congregation from January to now, all viewed through the lens of the Easter season. As you delve into the articles and peruse the accompanying images, may you feel the profound sense of community and the overwhelming power of God's love that permeates our faith community.

This season of Easter is one of rejoicing and renewing. We rejoice in the resurrection light that transcends all the evils of suffering in our lives and the world. We are renewed by the power of God's resurrection life, which transforms our ordinary selves into extraordinary witnesses who serve the community through acts of kindness and generosity.

In Easter, evil, sin, and death no longer have the upper hand in our lives. We will experience suffering and sin, or we will even die, but thanks be to Christ, we have the victory of life and hope through the resurrection story. We are now free to live in the power of that victory —to live over against our sins, sufferings, and death and to live a renewing life.

The fifty days after Easter, which make up the Easter season of the church year, are designed to help us rejoice in the resurrection. If Lent focuses our attention on the Cross of Christ, Easter focuses our attention on Christ's empty tomb that replenishes and revives us to be a faithful witness. Jesus died, yes, but he is risen. Yes, indeed! "Do not be afraid," Jesus says. "I am the first and the last ... I was dead, and see, I am alive forever and ever" (Rev. 1:18).

As we reflect on the significance of Easter, we are prompted to consider what the resurrection of Jesus Christ means for each of us today. Easter brings us joy in life. When Jesus utters, "Abba God, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing" (Luke 23:34), we can find solace in the fact that these wrongs are indeed forgiven. Jesus sacrificed himself on the cross to convert our worldly sins into the righteousness of God. Christ's resurrection is God's seal of approval, affirming that we have another opportunity to expand Christ's work, for he paid the price in full.





The resurrection is a testament to the truth that when Jesus declared, "It is finished," he was not mistaken. It is finished. He had fulfilled his mission - to love unconditionally as he laid down his life for the world. Paul writes, "In Christ, God was reconciling the world to God's self" (2 Cor. 5:19). When Jesus proclaims, "It is finished," he signifies the completion of reconciliation and renewal. You and I, who were once at odds with God, are now reconciled with God through Jesus Christ. It is finished. The battle is won. God has triumphed. You and I are captivated by the love of God and transformed into friends of God because God desires us to be beacons of hope in the world. The resurrection brings joy in life for the Christian. Therefore, we rejoice with hope for the world. As the writer of 1 John proclaims, our faith "is the victory that conquers the world."

Easter is the good news that puts a bounce into every step and a smile on every face for those who hear and believe it. Christians have joy in life because of Jesus Christ's resurrection. "We are an Easter people." Together, we celebrate 7 years of Ministry in May 2024. May we enjoy the season of Easter and the days ahead!

ACTIVITIES SINCE THE NEW YEAR

- 1. Re-Imagining Project The decision to proceed with our Re-Imagining Project was approved at our Congregational meeting held January 28, 2024. The proposal was submitted to our Regional Office for review and approval and we are awaiting final acceptance of same. In the meantime, \$17,000.00 was transferred from the Heritage account and is being held in the Trustee's account to pay for Phase 2 invoices due, once approval is received.
- 2. Line of Credit The line of credit at year-end was \$85,095.43. As of April 30, 2024 outstanding loan balance is \$80,500.00. We make payments of \$1,000.00 per month plus interest @ Prime +1.25% (8.45)
- 3. Grant The County of Simcoe provided a \$200,000.00 grant for use by local organizations serving breakfast. (Busby, Burton Avenue, Collier, Grace United, Ryan's Hope, St Mary's & Trinity Anglican). Collier has been asked to be the administrator for the flow-through funds, receipts and disbursements. Currently \$150,000.00 is held in Heritage Account and remainder is in the Trustee Account. As funds are required, they will be transferred from Heritage to Trustee account for disbursement.
- **4.** Transactions Jan 4, 2024 Trustees paid out the \$40,000.00 CEBA loan. January 11, 2024 \$25,000.00 was withdrawn from Heritage Account and transferred to Operating Account to help with overdraft and payroll. March 27, 2024 \$27,000.00 transferred from Heritage Account to Operating to pay for boiler and pump repair invoices.

RE-IMAGINE

Our Re-Imagining journey progressed substantially on January 28, 2024, when the gathered CSUC Congregation overwhelmingly supported accepting Trinity Centres Foundation's recommendation, "that Collier Street United Church explores partnership with the City of Barrie and a Developer to create a hybrid housing development and community hub in consultation with the Shining Waters Regional Council." This is wonderful news for the future of our space and the opportunities that reside within it, for CSUC and for the community!

During February, the Task Force launched a survey asking congregation members for their input on priorities under the headings, "Re-Imagined CHURCH", "Re-Imagined COMMUNITY HUB", and "Re-Imagined BUILDING/DEVELOPMENT".

Input was also specifically requested on Re-Imagining our parking lot space. Thank you to all who participated and provided their valuable input. Please know that your input is important as we move forward with this project.

Following our AGM held March 25th, the Transition Task Force submitted to the Communities of Faith Commission of Shining Waters Region a detailed CSUC Financial Viability Report and an update to our Living Faith Story, both required to support our decision to explore development. Since these reports were submitted, Task Force members have been liaising with both the Region and TCF to finalize the CSUC-TCF Contract for Phase 2, "Art of the Possible". We are hopeful to be moving forward with the contract in place before the summer.



In late May, Laurie Crosson and Lianne Patterson, Co-Chairs of the Transition Task Force, are attending a TCF conference entitled "Steeples, Cities and Circus 2024". The conference is taking place at St. Jax Centre in Montreal, which is TCF's flagship re-imagined site. St. Jax is an Anglican Church, which shares its space with several partners, including:

- Le Monastére Caberet de Cirque A non-profit circus company that supports the growth and development of contemporary circus by offering artists a platform to showcase their original creations.
- Action Réfugiés Montréal A strong voice for refugees in Montréal and beyond, that provides support for sponsorships, legal and material aid to detainees, and a highly successful twinning program which pairs newly arrived refugee women with former refugee women who are already established here in order to provide mutual support.
- Innovation assistance An initiative by Innovation Youth, which operates a food bank, Solidarity Market, and a meals-on-wheels service for people experiencing food insecurity in the neighbourhood.
- Wolfpack Street Patrol An Indigenous-led group which patrols the neighbourhood at night, providing comfort and essential supplies to un-housed neighbours.
- Calvary Chapel Montréal Régénération
- Church 21

We are excited to liaise with other faith organizations from across Canada and the USA who are going through re-imagining, and are at different stages of the process. Sharing our learnings with each other will no doubt help all of us. If you'd like to find out more about St. Jax Centre, you can access their website at stjax.org.
